
The Community Fund program is designed for community members who live, work, or go to school in the Valley and Plateau areas of Auburn.

There is money for projects in those communities that promote community wellness, accessibility, inclusivity, and connectedness. The goal is to create connections between community members, their neighborhoods, and the city of Auburn. Ideas will be given by community members, the City will look at these ideas and choose ones that fit the scope of the program, and present it the community to be voted on during the calendar year. The voted project (or projects depending on the budget) will be completed by the City along with potential volunteers. After the project is finished, the City will re-connect with community members to make sure the project fills the need. The City will look to finish the project within the calendar year.

The Community is defined as anyone who lives, works, or goes to school in Auburn.

Budget

There is \$25,000 available for community projects identified by community members. Depending on the projects selected by the community, there may be multiple projects that combined add up to \$25,000 or one large project that meets the \$25,000 limit.

Example Projects

- Art projects, especially those that reflect the character of the neighborhood.
- · Community gardens.
- Disaster preparedness projects (emergency backpacks, training, etc.)
- Rainworks: positive messages/art that are created with a clear paint, and appear when it rains.
- Renovation of play equipment, neighborhood park creation.

Ineligible Projects

- Infrastructure projects sidewalks, ADA ramps, speed bumps, road repair, etc.
- Projects that are for individual benefit or don't enhance the wider community.
- · Projects on private property.

City of Auburn Role

The City's role is to identify potential projects, get input from residents regarding potential neighborhood projects, scope the work, contract it out as needed, see projects through completion in a project management role, and gather feedback from community after completion of the project.

Community Role

The community's role is to submit ideas for projects in their communities, gain support for those ideas in their communities, and vote on the submitted projects in their local communities. There may be opportunities for community members to volunteer for the selected projects, depending on the scope.
